



Governor Schweitzer's Energy Intern Program At-a-Glance

The Basics

- Energy interns have the opportunity to gain experience in the field, build career skills, and earn money for college.
- After completing a 200-hour internship, students earn a \$2000 tuition credit.
- Internships are available with energy-related businesses, government agencies, schools, and non-profits around the state.
- In order to qualify for an internship, students must: have completed the equivalent of one semester of college coursework, be working toward a relevant degree at a public institution in Montana, and be eligible for financial aid.
- Students who wish to obtain academic credit for their internship should make arrangements with their school and host site prior to beginning the internship.

Applying

- Intern applications must be submitted online and should include the online form, a resume, cover letter, letter of recommendation, statement of need from the intern's financial aid office, and an unofficial transcript.
- Students who already have a project or a business in mind for their internship should work with that site directly. Both the intern and host site need to apply through energyintern.com
- Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis. Every intern must complete their 200 hours in a single semester (though extensions will be granted in special cases). All internships must be complete before fall 2012.
